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### Livermore-Amador Symphony 2020–2021 Season Announcement

In this pandemic, in these uncertain times, our society has turned to the arts for comfort, for inspiration, for activism, and for harmony. As arts leaders in our community, the Livermore-Amador Symphony has deeply missed collaborating in rehearsals and performing for our audiences, but we are still here for you.

The health and well-being of our musicians and audience must be prioritized over all else, and so we have made the difficult but necessary choice to extend our suspension of normal orchestral activities, rehearsals, and full concerts, through the end of 2020.

We will take the time remaining this summer and this fall to regularly evaluate and institute best practices to safely begin our LAS season in 2021. We will continue to explore ways to reach out to our community online or outdoors. Our organization is in good shape to endure this period and is planning for the day we can return to concerts at the Bankhead Theater, to our in-school outreach programs, and to our Holiday and Pops concerts.

We are excited and hopeful as we plan to resume operations in 2021, highlighted by the music of Beethoven, Prokofiev, Stravinsky, Mozart, Marquez, and Dvorak, and featuring piano soloists John O'Conor and Frederic Chiu.

# Farewell and Best Wishes, LAS Concertmaster Tina Anderson

Livermore-Amador Symphony Concertmaster Tina Anderson is leaving her position after 12 seasons with the orchestra. She and husband Steve intend to spend much more time at their home in Northern California.

I am so grateful to have partnered with Tina in leading the LAS over these last 6 seasons. She plays beautifully and combines deep professional experience with good pedagogical instincts, a great combination of skills for a community orchestra concertmaster.

To understand the importance of the role Tina has played over the years, it is necessary to know what a concertmaster actually does. You all know she starts the concert, striding onto the stage and leading the tuning. She is second in command to the conductor, and is not only the leader of the first violin sections, but really of all the string sections, often determining the bowings and who-plays-what when parts are divided. She is a co-pilot of sorts for the entire orchestra. She is also tasked with playing some of the most beautiful and demanding solos in the repertoire we play. Our audiences will particularly remember her *Schehera-zade* cadenzas, *Swan Lake* solos, Romanze from Schumann's Fourth Symphony, and so many others.

Tina has been truly devoted to this orchestra in the midst of a career as concertmaster of the Santa Cruz Symphony, the Diablo Symphony, and playing in the first violin sections of the Oakland Symphony, West Bay Opera, and other local orchestras. In addition to her responsibilities as Concertmaster here, Tina judged our Young Musicians Competition, led sectional rehearsals, volunteered her time serving on our music committee, and much more.

When I began my tenure as Music Director of LAS, it was the very first time I had led a community-based orchestra. All my prior experience had been with professional orchestras, and to be honest, I wasn't sure I had the right set of skills to do this well. In my first rehearsals and concerts, there were many times when I was stuck for an answer, searching and experimenting to find the right approach to a challenging musical passage. Tina often held the key to success, and with excellent timing and just the right "bedside manner" would deftly offer tricks of the trade that always helped her colleagues improve. In doing so, she often conveyed to me a solution that she could see was true to my musical vision, and would also be really successful for our wonderful musicians. I am a better conductor from my collaboration with Tina, and she helped this orchestra grow.



# OF ETHAN ALLEN PLATT

The Livermore-Amador Symphony

Guild is proud to honor Ethan Allen Platt with a Tribute to his musical legacy. Ethan recently passed away in May at the age of 102 having lived a full and joyful life. He was Charter President of the Livermore Symphony, founded in 1963



Ethan was much more than a lover of all things musical and a skilled clarinet player. He served in World War II as a lieutenant in the Philip-

pines and Japan and in the Korean War, then went on to earn a bachelor's degree in engineering and a master's degree in nuclear engineering. He was employed for 32 years at Lawrence Livermore National Laboratory in various projects related to nuclear powered engines,

research, and intelligence programs, and retired in 1984.

Ethan had a zest for life, enjoying to the fullest his music and contributions in his career. He continued to support the Symphony with his presence at concert performances and he maintained relationships with many LAS musicians throughout the years.

The Livermore-Amador Symphony Guild wants to honor Ethan's musical endeavors with an Imaginary Non-Concert that will raise funds to buy sheet music for the Symphony which will be labeled, "The Ethan Platt Tribute Fund."
