Beethoven: Egmont Overture Prokofiev: Lieutenant Kijé Suite Sibelius: Symphony No. 2

Join us as we explore themes of heroism, described in vivid symphonic detail. Inspired by the voice of his favorite writer, Goethe, Beethoven's *Egmont* Overture describes the heroism of the brave Count Egmont as he struggles and dies trying to liberate his country. Prokofiev, in some of his most inventive music, brings an imaginary military leader to life. His *Lieutenant Kijé* Suite follows this mythical man from his noble birth to a grand wedding, a wild sleigh ride,

and ultimately his death and burial. Finally, we conclude with the soaring second symphony of Sibelius, who became Finland's musical hero with this stirring masterpiece that came to represent the Finnish struggle for independence from their Russian occupiers at the turn of the 20th century.
