April 1 Concert Kaleidoscopic Color and Spiritual Sound

Notes from Lara Webber, Music Director and Conductor

We are so excited to bring the music of **Florence Price** to our community. Her first symphony is a truly great American symphony. It has the distinction of being the first symphony composed by a Black woman ever to be performed by a major American orchestra, the Chicago Symphony



(in 1933). Despite this great achievement, it is only now, in our era, that we are finally hearing her music. For centuries, western classical music has largely ignored the voices of women and people of color. Thankfully, this is changing, and our lives are truly enriched by this full embrace of the music of Florence Price and many other composers finally being heard.

The music is rooted in melody, in spirituals, in suffering and resilience, and in a feeling of profound faith in humanity. Within the framework of a traditional symphonic structure, Florence Price finds a freedom of expression, totally unique and daring musical choices, that take us on a deeply satisfying musical journey. It feels as though she is speaking to us in profoundly personal ways through her music.

Arturo Márquez is a leading Mexican composer who expertly uses orchestral forces to display the rhythmic vitality and rich tapestries of color of Mexican folk music. His popular Danzon No. 2 is infused with dance rhythms, beautiful sultry melodies, and is perfectly paced from a slow burn to a driving force of energy that can't help but get your feet moving and your smile broadening.

Our program also showcases young musical talent throughout the evening with performances by our three immensely talented winners from the Symphony's 50th Competition for Young Musicians (featured further in this newsletter). In addition, we are thrilled to bring back teen jazz band Element 116, under the direction of Matt Finders, who will entertain us during intermission.

We hope you will join us at the Bankhead on April 1st!

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Winners of the 50th Annual COMPETITION for YOUNG MUSICIANS

Minna Fu Juhye (Alice) Ho Owen Sheridan

The Livermore-Amador Symphony Association conducts the competition each October. Winners are each awarded a \$500 prize and perform as soloists with LAS.

Minna Fu, age 15, will perform the first movement of Piano Concerto No. 1 in C Major, by Mozart.

Minna began playing piano at age 5 and giving annual piano recitals at age 9. She obtained her first performance diploma, Associate of Royal Schools of Music with distinction at age 10 and obtained the Diploma of Associated Board of the Royal Schools of Music at age 12. In 2022, Minna obtained a performance diploma of Licentiate of Royal Schools of Music with distinction. She has won the Los Angeles International Liszt Competition, the United States Open Music Competition, the Sergey Rachmaninoff International Youth Piano Competition, the Russian Souvenir Piano Competition, the Glissando International Youth Piano Competition, the United States International Music Competition, the Sylvia M. Ghiglieri Piano Competition, Future Stars International Piano Competition, Chopin International Piano Competition in Hartford, Hart Husky Music Award, and the American Protégé Music Competitions. In 2019, she was invited to perform at Carnegie Weill Recital Hall. Minna has performed at music festivals, graduations, church fundraisers, and senior centers. She served as a choir accompanist at Thomas Hart Middle School in Pleasanton. She also plays piano on her own YouTube channel for her fans to view worldwide. Currently, Minna is the youngest docent of the nonprofit Music for Minors II, where she volunteers to give music lessons to elementary children each week.



Juhye (Alice) Oh will perform the third movement of Jacques Ibert's Flute Concerto. She is a senior at California High School in San Ramon.



Juhye is currently a flutist in the San Francisco Symphony Youth Orchestra and studies with flutist Isabelle Chapuis. Previously, she was a flutist in the Oakland Symphony Youth Orchestra. In June 2022, Juhye made her solo debut at Carnegie Hall. At the Aria International Academy and the Consummate Flutist, she performed in masterclasses with Lorna McGhee, Bonita Boyd, Alberto Almarza, and Alexa Still. Juhye won top prizes at the Pelican International Music Competition, American Classical Young Musicians Award, International Grande Music Competition, Great Composers Competition, Korean-American Music Supporters Association

(KAMSA) Competition, Silicon Valley Music Competition, and Junior Bach Festival. She performed at the San Jose Trianon Theater, KAMSA Winner's Recital, and Music Teachers' Association of California (MTAC) Recital. She also performed with the Idyllwild Arts Chamber Orchestra and Woodwind Quintet. Juhye is president and vice music director of Tri Valley Symphonics, an ensemble bringing music to libraries and senior centers.

Owen Sheridan, a first-year horn performance major at the University of the Pacific, will perform the first movement of Horn Concerto No. 1 by Richard Strauss.



Owen began studying horn in his second year of high school, with private teacher Steve Senavsky. He now studies with Professor Sadie Glass at Pacific's Conservatory of Music. Previously, Owen participated in performances with youth symphonies around the Bay Area including the Oakland Youth Symphony and the Young Peoples' Symphony Orchestra. At the same time as he began his studies at Pacific, he was accepted into the San Francisco Symphony Youth Orchestra where he will continue to gain orchestral experience. Owen's goal is to play horn professionally.
